Project Profile: Alice Carlson Applied Learning Center Outdoor Learning Environment

Location: 3372 W McPherson Ave. Fort Worth

Corner of Stadium and McPherson, just north of the TCU campus.



Step through a gateway shaped like an old fashioned school house and enter a school garden where dragonflies flit through cattails and butterflies swoop over native grasses. On a typical school day, you may see students from Alice Carlson Applied Learning Center reading stories under the trees or searching for butterflies and geckos. In 1997, this idyllic refuge was a cracked and weedy tennis court. Today the space is a model of what can happen when a coalition of Master Gardeners, teachers, administrators, parents, neighborhood groups, and businesses work together to create a garden that serves not only the school but also the community.

The Alice Carlson Outdoor Learning Environment (OLE) was designed as a natural garden representing Texas ecosystems including woodlands, desert, dripping springs, bog and prairie. Utilizing primarily native plants, the garden both conserves water and provides important wildlife habitat. The arroyo which diagonally bisects the garden carries surface water to the bog and is also one of the most beautiful features of the garden. Alice Carlson won the first place Project Award at the 2004 MG state meeting.

Numerous water features in the OLE attract wildlife and provide inspiration to students. Near the pondless waterfall students can sit on stone benches to read and write in journals. A boardwalk allows students to traverse the area designated as "The Bog." This area features a passive rainwater collection basin, a shallow pond teeming with gambusia, and a zone planted with containerized bog plants. The bog and the pond are both fed from harvested rainwater delivered at timed intervals.

Construction of the school's new gymnasium was the impetus for constructing a rainwater harvesting system. Rain from the gym roof travels through gutters and is collected in a 5,000 gallon above-ground cistern. The cistern delivers rainwater to the bog and pond via another pipeline. Changes in elevation from school to cistern to bog allow the entire system to function entirely by gravity flow. We have many exciting projects planned for the spring and invite anyone interested to join us.

President's Message

June 2009

So you want to apply for a grant or award for your TCMGA project? Here's what you need to do....

Step One – Inform the Executive Board of the planned grant or award request. The TCMGA Secretary maintains a log of all grants and awards applied for and by whom. The purpose of this is to ensure that we do not have two projects competing for the same grant. The first one that registers with the Secretary, is the one that is submitted.

Step Two – After drafting the application, forward an electronic copy (if possible) to the Executive Board for review. The Board reviews specifically for proper usage of the TCMGA name and any other entities named in the document.

Step Three – Submit the application and we will all hold our breaths with you!

Step Four - Inform the Executive Board as soon as it is determined that the grant or award has been granted or not.

Clarification – if TCMGA is not named in a grant or award application that you are working on for a TCMGA project, then this process does not apply. For example, the project chair at Alice Carleson may assist the school in writing a grant application, but the only named entity in the application is the school. Any award or grant received would be granted to the school. No funds would pass through TCMGA. Again, those situations are not within the scope of the above protocol.

Note – this process also applies to any Intern Class projects that choose to raise outside funds.

Gailon Hardin

Not much, short and sweet--like me.

Raised in Amarillo, graduated High School in 1961. I later graduated from Texas Wesleyan College. Retired as an accountant in 1999. Began a new career in conservation and giving back to the community. Joined Native Plant Society 1996, Master Composter 1998, Master Naturalist 1999, Master Gardener 2000.

Reason for becoming a Master Gardener : I was so excited about getting involved with the Southwest Sub-courthouse as a MG project. Projects like the sub-courthouse and the SW Regional Library get homeowners, commercial entities and Master Gardeners to see the beauty of natives and their benefit to the environment.

My one-acre property is planted entirely with natives and is watered three or four times a year. This is not my hobby, it's my passion and my responsibility to conserve water for my grandchildren.

I have three dogs, all named after Texas native plants — Chile pequine, Sumac, Lanceolata.

I also have three children that are not named after Texas native plants.

I attend many conferences each year on conservation. The last one: Fourteenth Annual Water Conference and Xeriscape Conference, Albuquerque, NM, February 2009.

Learned the following:

- 💧 Two billion people now live in water-stressed regions.
- 💧 In 2050, humans will need 80% more water just to be fed.
- 💧 Two-thirds of the world's population lack proper sanitation due to water shortages.
- 💧 In Africa, 2,000 square kilometers is becoming desert every day.
- 💧 Half of the world's hospital beds are occupied by people with water-borne disease.
- 💧 Every eight seconds a child dies of water-born disease.
- 💧 One of California's aquifers has been so heavily drilled, the aquifer is not only dry, but has collapsed and will never hold underground water again.
- 💧 North America will have 36 states suffering water shortages within the next five years.
- 💧 Arizona has been out of water for years.
- 💧 Lake Superior, world's largest freshwater lake, dropped to lowest level in 80 years.
- 💧 Lake Powell, the western backup water supply, has lost 60%.
- 💧 The west is the driest it has been in 500 years.
- 💧 Texas will be out of water in 2050.

The handbook has new information on plant disease and weeds. The biggest change is chapter 3 has all of the Earth-Kind information and contains

the Earth-Kind evaluation forms. The forms will be used to show the impact we are having on the community – how much knowledge is gained from presentations and the intent to implement change.

Bunny Williams from Dallas County gave an update on the 2010 conference. The conference will be held April 8 – 10 at the Omni Mandalay Hotel in Irving. All conference sessions and meals will be at the hotel. You can start booking your rooms now for next year. The website is: <http://www.2010tmgaconference.org>

The Directors heard two proposals for the 2011 conference. Lou Kellogg from Bexar County, San Antonio area, suggested that they would try to hold the cost down by holding the conference in one of three conference centers close into town but not the downtown area.
