Tarrant County Master Gardener Association Meeting Minutes - November 4, 2004

The meeting was called to order at 11:00 a.m. by President **Joann Hahn** at the Resource Connection. 134 members were in attendance. The minutes of the October 2004 meeting were approved as published in the Sharecropper. Treasurer **Warren Tingley** advised a Treasurer's report was available for review. Also, he asked all members 80 years and older to please advise him of their age in order to waive their yearly dues. Dues are to be paid by December 31st. President **Hahn** advised of the following:

TCMGA Website: The website will now have a travel feature. Project Manager **Devanie Fergus** needs winter schedules for TCMGA projects. A Long Range Planning document is posted on the website. Members are requested to review it.

Evaluation forms for Master Gardener Day were passed out at the meeting and **Ginger Bason** requested that they be completed and turned in before the end of the day.

Joy Lease has changed the raffle procedure to allow for direct selection of the item(s) a member may wish to win. Also, door prizes will be given at the Holiday social in December. Update on Urban Plant Detectives

The data observations and spraying are finished and now the number crunching begins. All the information has been turned into Dr. Kevin Ong to do 'statistical magic'. Master Gardeners met with Dr. Ong one final time at the Botanic Garden on November 5th to review and recap the project. Participating MGs identified many benefits of participating in the program: learning how to use pump up sprayers, mix a variety of both liquid and powder chemicals, treatment application, identify and quantify plant disease, make and record scientific data observations. and even some basic detective work! The learnings of these twelve individuals will ripple out beyond the original group with knowledge sharing with other MGs and the larger community.

With this, the two goals of the project are complete: 1) 'to equip Master Gardeners with the knowledge of doing basic research', and 2) ' to equip Master Gardeners with the knowledge to interpret the data scientifically.' Further, the information gathered from this project will be used by **Dotty Woodson** and several MG's to create a 'goldmine' research paper to be submitted to Extension.

Many thanks to those who participated in the project: Nancy Dozier, Devanie Fergus, Linda Hardy, Patsy Johnson, Joy Lease, Barbara Munn, Joyce Quam, Judy Ratzlaff, Susan Stanek, Warren Tingley, Eleanor Tuck, and Cindy Woelke. They have paved the way for future TCMGA data observation / gathering projects.

For all who are interested in participating in a study like this, **Dr. Ong** plans to have another project with training beginning in February. More information regarding this project will be available in January. Hats off to **Dr. Ong** for developing this super program for MGs.

HOLLY SPECIMEN TREES



Have you tried it all? Not quite!

You have tried or considered Crape Myrtles, Bradford pears, and other shrub-like trees for your landscape? The only problem is they are beautiful in the summer all leafed out. But when fall comes and they drop all the foliage and look like scarecrows. Why not consider the Holly?

The Holly, Ilex sp. is from the Aquifoliacea family. The genus has over 400 species of evergreen and deciduous trees, shrubs, and climbers. There are about a dozen that are popular in Texas and all are evergreen with one exception, the Possumhaw Holly, which drops its leaves in the winter but puts on a dazzling show of red berries that look like a Christmas tree.

Most hollies grow in zones 7-9, many as cold as zone 5. Hollies typically have three types of leaves. Normally leaves are thick and leathery.



Some species have spiny leaves that are sharp like needles, so plant them away from a walk and just admire them.

The beneficial characteristics of Hollies disease/insect resistance, tolerate most any type of soil, heat and cold tolerant, and keep putting on a show. Most of the hollies have beautiful red berries for fruit/seed. Most hollies are dioecious with some plants only growing female or pistillate flowerets and some only grow male or staminate. To make

sure you do not purchase a male plant, purchase hollies when there are berries on the plant.

My favorite is the Nellie R. Stevens' (Ilex cornuta 'Nellie R Stevens'). This tall beautiful holly is a vigorous, conical, evergreen female with sparsely spiny leaves and produces abundant scarlet fruit. It makes a splendid screen by a fence or as an accent next to the house. It is disease resistant, tough as nails, and requires little or no attention.

The Ilex cornuta 'Needle Point' holly is a close cousin to NRS holly.

The yaupon holly, Ilex vomitoria, is commonly grown as a trimmed hedge, tolerates a variety of soils, likes full sun to shade, and will thrive drought soil conditions. This one has small, thin, dark leaves, without the leather appearance of many other hollies.

Burford holly, Ilex cornuta 'Burford' is an excellent evergreen choice for a tall shrub under windows or down the side of your house. Leaves have a single spine and produce red berries freely.

To further add to your list of desirable hollies consider the following choices.

'East Palatka' is a pyramidal female tree, 'Foster' has a rounded, pyramidal form with orange-yellow berries, and of course the 'Mary Nell' that has a pyramidal form, dark olive green leaves with short spines and vivid red berries.

Which is best for you? Read about them and make your selection on height and width. The beauty of selecting hollies is, you just can't make a wrong decision.


