By the time this is published, spring will be upon us. For now, I will present to you a "State of the Organization" message. As announced at the last meeting.

there are two new issues from extension. One, is the coming requirement, that criminal background checks will be necessary for recertification. The other, is the issue regarding liability coverage of Master Gardeners for events occurring while volunteering. It was believed that the state would provide a defense, as well as cover any damage awards. It has been clarified that Master Gardeners would have to obtain counsel on their own. The state would provide assistance to the private attorney in filing the immune defense but would not represent us. At least one homeowners insurance company has said that it would provide the defense as part of the homeowners policy. This is worth each of you checking.

During all of this, I engaged an attorney who evaluated our corporate standing with the state and necessary filing requirements. The summary is as follows: Tarrant County Master Gardener Association was incorporated as a Texas Non-Profit Corporation 3/11/1996. We are a 501c3 corporation under the Internal Revenue Code, which exempts us from income tax on money received in conjunction with our charitable activities. We have a letter dated January 13, 2005 from Texas Comptroller, Carole Keeton Strayhorn, stating that "Tarrant County Master Gardeners Association INC" is exempt from payment of franchise taxes and consequently is in good standing with her office". The requirements for filing with the IRS are gross receipts of \$25,000 a year. As a charitable corporation we are not required to pay state sales tax for purchases related to our charitable activities.

So what does it all mean? We must remember that we are a corporation and, as such, we must be in compliance with all relevant state and federal regulations. It appears that we are in such compliance. Back to the real business. **Good Gardening!** Warren

## Tarrant County Master Gardener Association Meeting Minutes - February 3, 2005

The meeting was called to order by President **Warren Tingley** at 11:05 a.m. President **Tingley** welcomed the new interns to the meeting. Treasurer **Rita Hottel** gave the Treasurer's Report (a copy of the report was available for all members). Minutes of the January meeting were approved as published in the Sharecropper.

#### **New Business**

A report from the 2004 Audit Committee of the Treasurer was given by **Charlie Shiner**. The TCMGA Financial Statement was deemed acceptable. However, the Committee recommended all TCMGA committees follow established policies using appropriate forms in forwarding collected money to the Treasurer.

#### **Extension Items**

Horticultural Extension Agent **Steve Chaney** discussed the need for background checks on all members. These checks will be optional for 2005 but mandatory for 2006 in order for a member to recertify. The cost of these background checks will be borne by Tarrant County this year only. A form will be mailed to all members within the next few weeks.

A discussion was held regarding liability for members in the event of a lawsuit filed for alleged negligence during their volunteering duties. The members would not be provided with counsel but awards for damages would be paid by the State. Further investigation into this issue is on-going.

#### **By-Laws**

The proposed changes in the By-Laws of the Organization had been provided to the members. After discussion regarding the By-Laws, a vote was taken to approve them as written. The vote passed.

## Vegetable Gardening

(Excerpts from Vegetable Gardening Workshop recently presented by **Dotty Woodson**.)

This is a perfect time to plan a spring vegetable garden and take advantage of the remaining beautiful sunny winter days to prepare an area for a vegetable garden.

A successful garden is accomplished with planning and preparation. Many vegetable gardeners grow the entire year in this area. Many vegetables and herbs grow during mild Tarrant County winters. Vegetables like onions and potatoes are planted in February. **Sight Selection** 

- · A sunny location. Most vegetables need 6 to 8 hours of sun.
- ·Well draining location. Low spots that hold water encourage diseases. If your only choice is a low area, use raised beds.

#### Soil Preparation

- · An addition of organic matter every year. Add 6 to 8 inches of organic matter a year. Add organic matter by tilling compost into the soil and using mulch on the top of the soil after planting. Every year add more organic matter. The best source of organic matter is your own yard and garden waste. Don't bag it.
- · If your soil is the type of clay better used to make clay pots, considered raised beds.
- ·Remember you need water for the garden. Make watering continent by running water to the area or using enough garden hose to have water near the garden.

#### Plan

- · Start small. Plant only what you will eat. You can always extend the garden.
- ·Plant as early in the spring as possible. Spider mites like tomatoes and hot temperatures. The average date for the last frost is March 17 but be prepared to cover the plants just in case.
- ·Plant recommended varieties for this area. Plant disease resistant varieties. List of vegetables and planting dates are available from the Extension office or on the web site, http://tarrant.tamu.edu.

- ·Only plant the amount you will use fresh or preserve by canning, freezing or drying.
- · Give the plants room. Over crowding reduces air circulation. Good air circulation prevents disease.
- · Grow vertically. Squash, cucumbers and even with help, melons will grow vertically if supported. Use welded wire cages for support. Ladies hosiery will support melons if tied to a strong support.
- ·Rotate crops. Avoid planting the same plant family in the same location every year.

#### Water

- · Water early in the morning. Foliar diseases like damp leaves. Use drip irrigation. Garden centers, feed stores and home stores carry do-it-yourself drip irrigation supplies. Soil kept moist by proper watering and mulch does not dry to the point where the soil cracks. The cracks in the soil tear roots and damage the roots from air exposure.
- ·Use slow release fertilizers. Fertilizers are available from garden center, feed stores or home centers.

#### Weeds

- · Start with a weed free area. Before planting, kill Bermuda grass and other weeds by solar sterilization, digging or with a herbicide. Moisten the ground and cover it with black plastic for two sunny weeks or longer. Weeds attract many insects such as spider mites. Weeds use a lot of water that should be available to the vegetables.
- · Keep weeds under control by using mulch to cover the soil. Mulch also increases the water absorbing and holding capacity of the soil. A heavy mulch layer smother existing weeds and makes pulling weeds germinating easier.

## Walking Sticks

We called them stick bugs when I was a kid on the farm. At that carefree time, I didn't think about whether they were good bugs or bad bugs. I only knew they were fun to hold as they robotically rotated their little green head watching my every movement with their bulging eyes.

When my brother and I had friends from the city visit us during the hot Oklahoma summers, the stick bugs were a part of our guided country tour for the unsuspecting city kids. The walking sticks would bring squeamish squeals as we passed them from our bare arms to theirs. As I reflect on this scene, I feel quite sure that the stick bugs were probably as alarmed as our friends, but somehow they always seemed to outwardly maintain their composure.

Once the master gardener side of my brain was unlocked, I realized these little green sticks were not a gardener's favorite insect, but that didn't diminish their charm. I also realized that I hadn't seen any around my own home in Texas for years. Where had they gone?

The light bulb came on with a glare in the early spring when our pesticide company called for a routine spray around the outside parameter of our home. "No! No more poison! Let's see if we are overtaken with giant man-eating bugs if we don't spray on the outside!"

One hot summer morning as I watered the potted ferns on either side of the stairway leading to our upper yard, a tiny green head peered out at me from beneath a frond. From that morning on, we set about establishing a growing relationship. Typical woman – I would talk - and he would listen, turning his head from side to side and always keeping eye contact like an effective listener.

My little green friend lived in the fern all summer. It is fall now and sadly, he is gone.

What joy he brought to my morning waterings. Winter will soon be approaching and plants will be cut back and brought in. I will do my best to keep the ferns alive in hopes that next spring my little green friend and I can resume our friendship. Maybe, with a little bit of luck, I'll even be introduced to some of his kin.

#### Twostriped walkingstick—Scientific name:

Anisomorpha buprestoides (Phasmatodea: Pseudophasmatidae) Facts: Walkingsticks are well known for their slow-moving behavior and camouflage. Their long bodies, legs, antennae, and color make them appear to be sticks. They feed on plants and sometimes defoliate trees. The longest insect in the United States is a walkingstick, Megaphasma dentricus (Stal), which reaches a length of about 7 inches.
