Roasted Tomato Salsa

8 plum tomatoes
3 cloves garlic crushed
1 cup chopped onion
1 jalapeño pepper, sliced
and seeded
1/2 tsp sea salt
1 tsp smoked paprika
Olive oil
Spread tomatoes, garlic,
onion, jalapeño on a shallow

baking list. Sprinkle with salt and paprika. Spray or brush with olive oil. Bake @375 for 30 minutes. Cool, then place on food processor. Add 3 Tbls fresh limejuice 1/2 cup fresh cilantro 1/8 tsp pepper Process until smooth or slightly chunky.
