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Native Plant Feature

<u>Fall Flowering Lilies</u>: Spider Lilies, Oxblood Lilies & Rainlilies

One indication of an eventual end to our long, hot summer is the emergence of several fall flowering lilies. Spider lilies (Lycoris radiata), oxblood lilies (Rhodophiala bifida) and certain rainlilies (Zephranthes) species suddenly appear and add color to our tired, heat-weary gardens. These plants are not natives, but are so well adapted; these plants come back year after year and slowly increase in numbers and flower production.

All three of these fall flowering bulbs produce most of their foliage during the winter and spring, go dormant during the heat of summer and then flower in early fall. These plants actually require a dormant period during the heat of summer when little or no water is needed. Artificial watering during this period may be harmful to these plants. Spider lilies and oxblood lilies are especially sensitive to over watering during their "baking period;" therefore, it is best to plant these tough hardy bulbs out of reach of normal sprinkler systems or artificial watering.

Spider lilies are a novelty in the world of



ornamental plants. Each spring the strap-shaped foliage appears, ripens and then dies down in the heat of summer. In September, usually after a soaking rain, clusters of red, pink, white or yellow flowers suddenly

spring forth from the ground. Stems may reach 18 to 24 inches, and they are topped with spidery-like flowers with wavy-edged segments and long stamens. Spider lilies are very easy to grow. The red form (Lycoris radiata) is much more common than the others and is the easiest to grow. You can see these wonderful plants flowering at the Fort Worth Botanic Garden around the clock and in the Fuller Garden.

Oxblood lilies are an introduction from Argentina.

A German-Texas plantsman named Heinrich Oberwetter, an early colonist in central Texas, brought oxblood lilies to Texas. Oxblood lilies are well adapted to heavy clay or deep, sandy soils. The flowers resemble small red amaryllises and are borne several to a stem. Foliage is strap-like and emerges after flowering to flourish through the winter, and then it yellows and disappears by summer.

Among the large and diverse group of plants known as rainlilies, the most common cultivated form is Zephranthes candida, the white rainlily, which is sometimes called "Autumn Crocus" because of the tendency to bloom profusely in the fall. The foliage somewhat resembles thin dark green monkey grass and is useful as an edging plant in the garden during the fall, winter, and spring when its foliage is most abundant and attractive. White rainlilies are native to the shores of Rio de la Plata, the River of Silver, in Argentina. Flowers appear mostly in late summer and fall, usually beginning with the first autumn showers.

Rainlilies, oxblood lilies and spider lilies are propagated by dividing mature clumps of the plants. Division is successful at any season, but transplanting just after the foliage starts dying down in late spring or early summer is less likely to interrupt their bloom cycle. These plants are not always available at local nurseries but be sure to ask. I ordered my Lycoris from a bulb catalog. A friend from Lake Worth gave me my Oxblood lilies. I purchased my rainlilies from Weston Gardens. The Fort Worth Botanic Garden is having a plant sale Saturday, October 23. Rain and oxblood lilies will be available at the FWBG Plant Sale.

The Crape-Myrtle mildew study is in full force and welcomes **Emily Ward** to the project. The four volunteer teams have been spraying and observing for several weeks now. The five different treatments are being sprayed on twenty crape-myrtle plants behind the conservatory at the Botanic Gardens.

These volunteers are learning a lot about measuring, mixing and sprayers. Patsy Johnson's team (includes Patsy, Devanie Fergus, and Cindy Woelke) was the first team to spray. Some of the things they passed on to the next team were the measurements for mixing the chemicals to create no more than needed and tips for care of the sprayers. There are five more weeks of spraying and data observation, along with two additional training sessions with Dr. Ong. The project will end with summarizing our results and submitting those to Dr. Ong for consolidation with results of other participating counties.

If you are interested being a part of a study like this, Dr. Ong will have another project with training beginning in February 2005. More information regarding this project will be available in January.
