# The Big Green Industry

ort Worth is often referred to as Cowtown, but Flowertown might be a more accurate nickname. Ornamental plant sales income for Tarrant County in 2010 as reported by Dr. Marco Palma, Texas AgriLife Extension Agricultural Economist, was \$161,776,552. The 2010 Texas AgriLife Extension Agricultural Income Report estimated income from Beef Cattle sales at \$5,700,000. That's about \$28 dollars in plant sales for every dollar of cattle sales. Maybe it's time to change that longhorn logo!

Our plant production industry has fared especially well through the recent economic downturn because the majority of ornamental plant producers in north central Texas specialize in growing "color" or bedding plants. Sales of these annuals and perennials are not as dependent upon new construction as sales of trees and shrubs.

In addition to the fact that these types of plants need to be replaced regularly, bedding plant sales have also benefitted from an increased interest in vegetable gardening and edible landscaping. Many people have probably purchased their very first vegetable and herb transplants in the past few years. According to a nationwide Harris Interactive survey conducted in January 2009 on behalf of the National Gardening Association, 43 million U.S. households planned to grow their own fruits, vegetables, berries, and herbs in 2009, a 19 percent gain from 36 million in 2008.

As they say in every infomercial, "but wait, that's not all!" The green industry's total contribution to Tarrant County's economy in 2010 included sales of over \$1 billion, with the previously mentioned \$161 million from the ornamental plant production industry, \$243 million in landscape services and \$691 million in retail nursery sales. In addition, a


growing local food segment produces horticultural crops on small acreage growing small fruits and vegetables, tree fruit and nut crops, grapes, and herbs.


Landscape services have an especially large impact on our economy because that segment accounts for almost half of green industry jobs. In their report, Economic Impact in Texas (January 2012), Dr. Palma and Dr. Charlie Hall calculated the number of full time equivalent jobs required to produce the volume of green industry sales in the Fort Worth metropolitan statistical area at 14,401. That's a lot of people who are earning a paycheck.


The retail segment has also performed well in comparison with other parts of the country and other types of retailers. Retail Online Integration reviewed publicly held retail companies in the United States by analyzing net sales data from the 2010 to 2011 fiscal year and ranked local garden center chain Calloway's Nursery number 20. Calloway's growth beat out the big box garden retailers Home Depot and Lowe's and ranked right up there (not quite up there) with such retail stars as Amazon.com, Chipotle Mexican Grill, Ulta Cosmetics, and Apple Stores.

In addition to the economic impact of commercial horticulture in Tarrant County, the industry has a positive impact on our urban environment. Managed landscapes decrease air pollution, help manage storm water runoff, reduce noise pollution and the urban heat island effect, provide habitat for wildlife and encourage physical fitness and outdoor community activities. Commercial horticulture isn't only big, it's truly green.

#### SOME IDEAS ON USING THE 28-0-0 FERTILIZER YOU PURCHASED FROM THE TCMGA

Now that you have purchased 2, 4 or 6 bags of the 28-0-0 fertilizer, how do you apply it to your lawn? Here's some points to assist you:

- 1. Apply 3.57 pounds of this fertilizer per 1000 square feet to your lawn.
- 2. Use a broadcast spreader to apply it to your lawn including your shrubs.
- 3. Water in immediately after applying. A watering of 1 to 1 and one-half inches is recommended.
- 4. Do not use a weed and feed. Good!! AgriLife does not recommend these types of fertilizer.

#### More about all these fertilizer ideas.

Most of Tarrant County is blessed with clay soils. Phosphorus naturally occurs in our soils. Almost all of our soil tests completed on these soils show medium to high results, except for nitrogen. Potassium is usually higher than normal as it also occurs naturally in our clay soils. By buying 28-0 -0, this means that you know that your soils are typical. If you are not sure, take a sample and test.

One half of the fertilizer that you purchased is slow-release, designed to release nutrients over a relatively long period of time. Sulfur-coated urea, a synthetic organic fertilizer, is a slow release fertilizer with a covering of sulfur around each particle. Watering does not affect the release of this fertilizer, heat does. The resins of sulfur control the rate of release from the granules into the soil, depending on the thickness of the sulfur. Release can take from three to six months. Of course with high Texas heat high release rates are sometimes observed.

The other 50 percent of the fertilizer is quick release Ammonium Nitrate. It is fast acting, with greater burn potential, and lower cost. It leaches readily.

#### How much fertilizer to apply?

The 50# bag of fertilizer you bought contains 14

lbs. of nitrogen. No phosphorus or potassium. The rest of the material in the bag is sand or other inert materials. I am going to assume that you are applying the fertilizer to a 1000 Sq. Ft. lawn. The last assumption is that we are going to apply a TAMU recommended one pound of nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. For lawns this is a typical recommendation. Below is an example of how to calculate the required amount:

- a. Divide 1 (the recommended rate) by the percentage of nitrogen (.28). This will give you the rate per 1000 sq. ft. (3.57 lbs.) If you were using for example—15-5-10. Divide 1 by .15. You would need 6.67 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft.
- b. Then multiply the lbs. of fertilizer by the rate per sq. ft. 3.57 x 5000/1000= Apply 33 pounds/ 5000 sq.
- c. For our 28-0-0 apply  $3.57 \times 5000/1000 = 17.85$ pounds.

#### I've got my fertilizer and know how much to apply, how do I apply it.

Fertilizer application is not an exact science. One must determine the quantity, select the type of equipment and try applying on 1000 sq. ft.. The choice of equipment is a drop or broadcast type spreader. Broadcast is easiest and quickest with the least amount of time and effort.

- 1. Using a broadcast spreader (one that spins and throws the fertilizer in a wide band) one can fertilize their shrubs and flowers at the same time as their grass Of course one might waste fertilizer spreading it on sidewalks and driveways.
- 2. If one uses a drop spreader (spreading fertilizer in a narrow band) one can strip the grass, at the least one should crisscross the unfertilized areas.

Lastly always water in immediately after application with 1 to 1 and one half inch after application. The quick release fertilizer can be completely lost after 2-3 inches of rain. The slow release will not be affected.

# April TCMGA Meeting Guest Speaker

John Snowden combines talents and skills garnered from a lifetime of outdoor activities, an intense interest in learning about the natural world, a bachelor's degree from Texas A&M in Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences, and a willingness to listen to experience. The underlying philosophy of **BLUESTEM** 

**NURSERY** is to promote natural habitat rehabilitation through education and the use of attractive, native, ornamental grasses. Imported species and nongrasses are included only due to market demand, and natural substitutes are used whenever possible only due to market demand, and natural substitutes are used whenever possible Efforts on Snowden's own property yield at least one previously unseen animal on the land each year and occasionally plants previously unknown on the 40-acre site. When you can walk out your back door on a fine April evening and see a young Tom Turkey walking across your driveway for the first time in 36 years, that's progress!

Still, the plants must be esthetically appealing to all, not just a few, in order to appeal to abroad market. Snowden learned color evaluation during his Master's thesis and applies his knowledge to color selections of native grasses. Most are very well received and in increasing demand.

The Texas environment produces only a finite amount of rainfall, yet the population, and therefore the demand for drinking water, is booming. The net result is less water available for irrigation purposes and a greater need for adapted plants requiring less or no watering once established. The native ornamental grasses fit this demand admirably. If properly placed in conditions similar to their natural niche, most thrive on little or no watering.

John will talk about landscaping with grasses in the morning and propagation of grasses in the afternoon.


