"The First"

A "first" trip to the "City of Eternal Spring", Cuernavaca, Mexico, was conducted June 14-21, 2013. The trip was organized through the Center for Hispanic Studies in Nursing and Health, College of Nursing, University of Texas at Arlington (UTACON). Our bi-lingual tour guides, Dr. Mary Lou Bond and Dr. Kristina Ibitayo, have been taking students to Universidad Internacional in Cuernavaca for over 20 years.

Exploring the gardens of this Mexican city was but one aspect of this cultural experience. Classes at Universidad Internacional (UNINTER), the school where we met, arranged classes about the architecture and how the gardens are designed. A trip to the Ethnobotanical garden was one to be remembered because of the breadth of its horticultural offerings. Visiting the nurseries in the same city provided information on recycling of water and a view of the poinsettias being cultivated for Christmas shipping.

Did you know that:

- Tomatoes are the # 1 fruit produced in Mexico,
- Much of the soil in Cuernavaca is of volcanic origin, and
- Azaleas make nice hedges in Cuernavaca.

Being hosted in the homes of friendly and supportive families who provided Mexican



hospitality added cultural dimensions and insights, not attainable when in a hotel. A 'cooking class' offered participants the opportunity to try their skills at a beautiful garden home. An 'extra' was a side trip to Taxco, the Silver City of Mexico; it offered participants the opportunity to purchase souvenirs from local designers.

Master Gardeners also worked with Universidad Internacional (UNINTER) administrators and labeled plants on the campus. A brochure describing the plants

is being developed and will be available to students at the University. Permanent plaques will be placed near the labeled plants, recognizing the Tarrant County Master Gardeners.

Thank you for your support of our garage sale/silent auction and projects.


The money raised benefits our projects.

Landscape Design Study Course

The <u>Landscape Design Study Courses</u> are held in College Station, Texas in conjunction with the <u>Texas Garden Clubs, Inc.</u> and <u>Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service</u>. They are offered in four separate schools, approximately six months apart. Participants may take the four courses in any sequence. Garden Club members, Master Gardeners*, nurserymen and others who are interested in furthering their knowledge of landscape design are welcome to attend.

Next course: September 23-24, 2013 in College Station, TX (Series XXIII, Course III)

* Master Gardeners: This is an opportunity for more in-depth training in landscape design than is normally included in the Master Gardener curriculum. Each course is typically approved by local Master Gardener chapters to qualify for 12 hours of continuing education toward maintaining certification for Master Gardeners.



The 1st annual EcoScape Contest is open to residential landscapes within Fort Worth city limits and Fort Worth's wholesale customer cities, which include Aledo, Bethesda Water Supply Corp., Burleson, Crowley, Dallas/Fort

Worth International Airport, Dalworthington Gardens, Edgecliff Village, Everman, Forest Hill, Grand Prairie, Haltom City, Haslet, Hurst, Keller, Kennedale, Lake Worth, Northlake, North Richland Hills, Richland Hills, Roanoke, Saginaw, Southlake, Trophy Club Municipal Utility District, Westlake, Westover Hills, Westworth Village and White Settlement.

(Contest judges, sponsors, City of Fort Worth employees or their families are not eligible for prizes. The EcoScape Contest is co-sponsored by the Fort Worth Water Department and BRIT.)

- The contest features front yard landscapes (1,000 ft. minimum)
- Up to three residential award winners (1^π, 2nd and 3rd place) will receive prizes. Community
 gardens, demonstration gardens and commercial landscapes are not eligible to participate.
- All participants must agree to have their landscapes photographed and consent to allow such
 photographs to be used by the City.
- All winners must agree to be present to answer visitor questions from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on tour day

Judging Criteria

- Design
- Aesthetic appeal; composition; use of color and plant variety
- Water Conservation

Efficient irrigation/water use; use of non-vegetative materials such as fences, walls, walks, etc.; use of native or adapted plants; reduced turf area; and use of mulches

Appropriate Maintenance

Landscape tidy - healthy, disease and pest free plants; no weeds; plants pruned as appropriate

Entry Deadline August 16, 2013.

To download the Call for Entry form please visit www.FortWorthTexas.gov/water and click on EcoScape. Entries will be judged in late August (August 19-23) and winner's names will be released the first week of September.

The public tour of landscapes will be held Saturday, September 14, 2013. All winners will be announced online.
