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Plant a Tree

"The best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The second best time is now." –Chinese Proverb

This saying has been used to inspire people to start doing all sorts of things they should already be doing such as saving money or returning to school, but when it comes to literally planting a tree in Texas, now is truly the best time.

Texas A&M Forest Service surveys indicate that the historic drought of 2011 killed 301 million trees in rural areas and 5.6 million trees in urban areas. Here in Fort Worth, City Forester Melinda Adams reports the removal of 1800 dead trees from parks and parkways, a dramatic increase over a typical average of 500 per year. Because drought stressed trees will be slowly dying for the next five to ten years, the full effects of the drought on tree numbers may never be measured. There has clearly been a great loss of Texas trees in the past few years, and even though there's a bumper crop of acorns this fall across the state, nature could use a little help from its friends. This is especially true in urban areas.

Regional Urban Forester Courtney Blevins completed a canopy analysis of Tarrant County in November 2011, well before the full impact of the drought, and found that only 23.6% of the total land area is covered by tree canopy. Contrast that with 27.2% covered by impervious surfaces and it is easy to see that there is plenty of hot pavement and not enough cool shade in this neck of the not-so-woody woods.

That same analysis classified 23.2% of the county as plantable, which is defined as all non-agricultural use, treeless locations where a tree could and **should** be planted. Areas under power lines, golf course fairways, sports fields, etc. or

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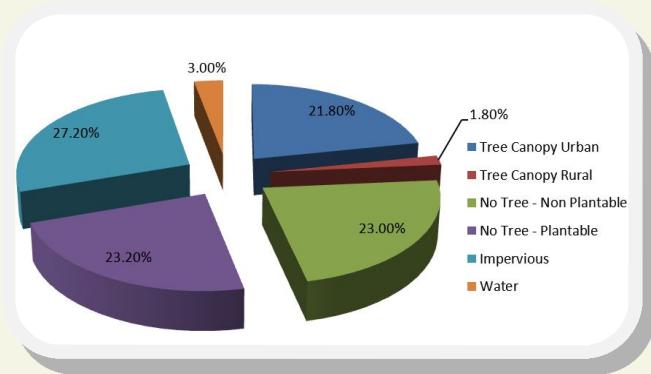

sites where there is open ground but not enough room for a mature tree are not included.

Tarrant County Canopy Analysis –November 2011



Another way to discuss the best time to plant is by time of year. Container grown trees can be planted at any time of year but the heat of the summer is the most difficult time to successfully establish a newly planted tree.



Bare root and balled and trees wrapped in burlap should only be planted during the winter.

If the time to plant is indeed now, and the place is here, all that's left are the details.

1. Choose right tree for the site

- The Texas Tree Selector is a great online tool <http://texastreeplanting.tamu.edu/>

2. Choose the healthiest tree available

- Look for a single trunk and a strong central leader

- Look for an obvious root flare at the base of the trunk
- Look at the roots—avoid trees with roots that circle the container
- Follow recommended planting procedures
- Don't plant too deep
- Fill the hole with the native soil. Do not amend. There is no way to amend the entire area where a tree's roots will grow

3. Water

- Smaller trees establish more quickly, but all trees need supplemental irrigation. Plan to deliver water (1-3 gallons per inch of caliper) daily for two weeks and weekly for three months per caliper inch. A two inch caliper tree should be established in about six months.

4. Mulch

- Apply 2-4 inches over the root ball. Pull mulch away from the trunk of the tree
- It moderates soil temperature, reduces water loss, keeps weeds away and makes the tree much less susceptible to string trimmer and lawn mower damage

If you don't have any space to plant, get involved in community tree planting efforts. Even if you can't swing a shovel, you can still be an advocate for trees.

She also thanked all the vendors present. She asked that everyone please fill out a survey concerning our organization for the next year. Ballots are available for nominees for Master Gardener Awards. Certified Master Gardeners can nominate someone for Master Gardener of the Year, Educator of the year, and for Extra Mile award. Interns can vote on intern awards.

The meeting was called to order at 11:05a.m.

Executive Board

The minutes of the October meeting were approved as published in the newsletter.

Speakers would not accept payment, contents of the gift bags were all donated, the only expense was lunch, snacks, gift baskets for speakers, printing costs, and partial cost recovery to A&M. Resulting in all expenses coming in under estimations, which resulted in a significant income from the conference of \$2,570.

Pavilion at the community garden

A pavilion at the community garden has been a dream for many years. We have an estimate of \$23,690 to build it. It will be 20x30 with a brick or paver floor. There will be accessible paths leading to the pavilion. There will be electricity and ceiling fans. It will also include an outdoor kitchen so we can hold classes on canning and cooking vegetables. The source of the funds will come from:

There will be no storage as that put us over budget and we have ample storage now. Construction will begin after all permits have been acquired and Commissioners Court has voted on it. It will be completed by the first of the year.

Laptops and projectors for the Speakers Bureau

The executive board proposed purchasing two new laptops and projectors for the Speakers Bureau to replace and enhance aging equipment. The new equipment will cost \$2,262 with \$568 coming from the Speakers Bureau Budget and \$1,694 coming from Computer Equipment Improvement Fund. Announcements

Claudia Teague, Master Gardener, Class of 2008 and her husband, Cliff helped me make a Bottle Tree for the Resource Connection. We cut the iron with the help of the TCU Dietician Class, Group 2, took it to Azle and with the help of Cliff welded it together. With the guidance of Steve Chaney, we placed the tree near the entrance of the garden. Yet our work is not yet completed.

There is a story behind each Bottle Tree. The roots of the Bottle Tree are in the middle of the 9th century Africa, where the Congo Tree Altar is a tradition of honoring the deceased with memorials. The beliefs evolved over time, and during the slave trade, followed the slaves to the southern United States.

In one variation of the belief, bottles were placed on the ends of cedar tree branches, in hopes that any devilish spirits lurking nearby might be attracted to the colorful bottles. So mesmerized by the colors the spirits would become trapped inside the bottles. The trapped spirits are then destroyed when the sun comes out the next morning.

Although bottles of many colors were used, blue was thought to be an especially potent spirit repellent. It is believed that blue, the color of sky and water, have the power to repel or overcome evil.

breaks, so take care around the bottle
tree!"**

Given the history of the bottle tree we would like to place a cobalt blue glass bottle on each branch of the tree to respect the heritage of the tree, but we do not have enough and have been unable to locate them in the DFW area. Could you help?

If you have any empty cobalt blue bottles please bring them to the garden so we can use them on the Community Garden tree. We need at least 12 and a few more in case of any breakage problems. Thanks for your help. We hope that you enjoy the tree, albeit a little different.
