## **DEM Bones**

When Jack Frost stops by for a visit and renders your perennials brown crispy remnants of their former glory or when Old Man Winter drops buckets of the white stuff all over your garden, what is left?

#### Dem bones. Garden bones, that is.

Garden bones get to shine when the blooms have faded. Garden bones consist of those things in our gardens that give structure and strength, height and depth, bringing interest whether our gardens are a riot of color or there's not a single bloom in sight.



Just as our bodies would be a lifeless pile of skin, so our gardens would look dead without bones!

So, just what are these bones that I speak of?



They are the permanent structures in our gardens that add interest no matter the season, such as **trees**, **evergreen shrubs**, **walkways and paths**, **ponds**, **fountains**, **statuary**, **arbors**, **trellises**, **gazebos**, and **benches**.

Evergreen trees or large shrubs have good form as well as function. Not only do evergreens anchor a garden design and give it structure, they can serve as a screen from the neighbors, as a windbreak from harsh northern winds, or just as a backdrop for deciduous shrubs and/or perennials. Hollies, laurels, nandinas, and other shrubs with berries also provide food for winter birds.

Just as "the leg bone connected to the knee bone and the knee bone connected to the thigh bone," so garden bones connect different areas of our gardens, tying them all together. Garden paths, whether made of stone, gravel, mulch or grass, allow the visitor to meander throughout the garden. Well-placed seating invites visitors to sit a spell.



Even the layout of garden beds, whether in long sweeping curves or formal straight lines, constitutes this skeleton of the garden. Good

bones give your garden visual appeal even before a single plant has gone in the ground...



...as well as after the plants have gone dormant.

It was lookin' a lot like Christmas for nearly 50 Master Gardeners as they visited the greenhouse on November 16 where the Botanic Garden staff grows more than 300 poinsettias used as gifts and decorations.

Trip Smith led the behind-the-scenes look at the growing process which can begin as early as March for the beautiful 4-foot poinsettias that this year Trip pronounced as the most perfect he has seen in his more than 30 years in plant production. The staff grows a variety of sizes and white and pink poinsettias, too. (Our Master Gardeners have given Trip some of these new varieties to propagate in his greenhouse.) Some MGs went home with Trip's poinsettias at the Christmas luncheon which he generously donates as door prizes.

While the Botanic Garden greenhouse provides the perfect conditions for growing poinsettias, Trip offered these tips for those who want to try to get last year's plant to rebloom at home:

- September 15-20 place the plant in a closet or covered from 5 p.m. to 7 a.m.
- Soil composition is similar to Miracle-Gro or other commercially-available potting soil. That type of soil is used for most of the propagation throughout the gardens.
- Maintain a temperature between 65 and 85 degrees.
- Plant should be watered thoroughly. Only water when plant is dry to the touch.

The plant should be in bloom by Thanksgiving. He admits that these conditions are hard to maintain in a home environment and too often the poinsettia blooms in March!

Sharing space in the greenhouse with the poinsettias is one of the largest collections of orchids in the U.S. Many of them given to Trip by frustrated orchid growers. He admits that orchids are difficult to grow outside of a greenhouse. His staff has been successful in growing orchids and many of them have won prizes. A tip on getting them to rebloom is to fertilize every third watering.

Also on the behind-the-scenes tour was a visit to the begonia collection – the largest in the United States. Debbie Garrett explained that while the showy hybrids are the big sellers at the plant sales, a major focus at the greenhouse is to maintain the collection of rare species from around the world. The staff regularly entertains experts from around the world who come to see the collection and to take cuttings. MGs took home cuttings from the hybrid collection and were taught how to propagate the leaf cuttings.
