"George W. Bush

Library Grounds Tour"

What great weather for the president George W. Bush Library Grounds Tour which occurred on Thursday, May 22. The grounds are open to visitors without paying to go into the museum.

The Library Grounds are a 15-acre park, designed with forebays and bioswales. A forebay is an artificial pool of water in front of a larger body of water. Bioswales are landscape elements designed to remove silt and pollution from surface runoff water.

Water from the paved service area and the building is filtered before it is released into the bioswales. The water is discharged into the forebay, where large limestone blocks temporarily detain the water, slowing down its velocity and allowing sediments to settle out. Their under ground cistern holds 250,000 gallons of water.

One of the most widespread ecologies on the site is the tall–and short-grass Prairie, composed of Big Bluestem, Little Bluestem, Indian Grass, and Switchgrass among many other grass species. The persistent prairie species cover both gentle and steep slopes, and are accented by seasonal wildflowers such as Horsemint, Coneflowers, Daisies, and Indian Blanket. After the establishment period, this native plant community will require no irrigation. Designed for something to bloom year round.

The nearly nine acres of lawn at the Bush Center are a mixture of short prairie grasses, making them considerably more sustainable than typical commercial lawns. The native mix—which includes Buffalo Grass, Blue Grama, Texas Grama, Poverty Dropseed and Curly Mesquite—is drought tolerant, needs limited mowing, and requires minimal fertilization. With the change in our Metroplex's' watering we may all want to look into this native grass variety.

Gardening Tips & Tidbits

DID YOU KNOW THAT...

Water Conservation

The Iawn

and garden are a great place to practice water efficiency. Use them as a clean slate to stimulate creativity in your choice of colorful, drought tolerant plants, shrubs and trees.

Watering Tips

- Water deeply and infrequently, about one inch every 5-7 days.
- Water early in the morning to reduce evaporation.
- Watch for signs of thirst in your lawn and water only when needed.
- Water slowly for better absorption. With clay soils, turn off the sprinkler when runoff occurs. Wait 20 minutes for water to absorb into ground. Dig a test hole to see how deeply it absorbed. Repeat steps until the water penetrates six inches deep.
- Never water on windy days.
- Consider using drip irrigation in flower and vegetable gardens for greater water efficiency.
- Discover the beauty and benefits of mulch. Mulch helps your soil retain water around plants. Apply at least two inches around shrubs, trees, plants and vegetable gardens, several times a year.
- Eliminate unwanted weeds which drink water intended for plants.
- Install a rain sensor to prevent water waste.
- Keep grass blades longer in the summer. This will shade the soil and provide better water retention.


